 - Provides temporary housing for homeless families, focusing on those with children under the age of 19 in a structured, programmatic environment to assist families develop the necessary skills, education and income to obtain long-term permanent housing within 24 months of program intake
 - On-site services include: case management services and referral, budget counseling, housing counseling, and life skills counseling, legal services assistance, Ka Pa'alana learning environment for preschool age children
 - Fees include \$400 or \$525 per month depending on the housing unit provided
-  **Catholic Charities Hawai'i (CCH), Mary Jane Home Residential Services (☎ 261-9776) (<http://catholiccharitieshawaii.org/programs/unplanned-pregnancy/mary-jane-home>)**
 - Residential program in a group home setting for pregnant women 18 years and older
 - Provides a safe, supportive environment where women can prepare for their child and work toward accomplishing goals
 - Mary Jane Home services include:
 - ◆ Life skills, infant care and parenting education
 - ◆ Childbirth education
 - ◆ Birth coaching (doula services)
 - ◆ Individual and group counseling
 - ◆ Case management / planning and goal setting
 - ◆ Mentoring services
 - ◆ Follow-up services
 - Women who are waitlisted for residential services or who have completed the program can also receive support through the Community-Based Pregnancy Services

 - ◆ Applicant must have at least one minor child under 18 years old living in the home
 - ◆ Resources and assets valued at less than \$5,000
 - ◆ Gross monthly income must be less than 185% of the Federal Poverty Level for household size (determined by housing specialist)
 - ◆ Must be capable of making future rent payments and provide proof of financial stability after assistance is given

- Provides transitional housing for women and children facing challenging life circumstances to permanent housing
- Rent, which includes two daily meals, is \$450 per month
 - ◆ Participants are eligible for six-month residency
- Amenities include: common areas for work, study, recreation, and relaxation, computer lab with free internet, internet access and telephone in each room, two meals per day—breakfast and dinner, coin-operated laundry facility, dining room with kitchenette amenities
- Must meet the following criteria:
 - ◆ Single female; or single parent with one dependent residing (males must be under 5 years old)
 - ◆ At least 19 years of age
 - ◆ Free from drug and alcohol dependence
 - ◆ Verifiable employment of at least 20 hours per week
 - ◆ Able to live unassisted and function in a community setting
 - ◆ Available to volunteer two hours per week to YWCA
 - ◆ Committed to working toward self-sufficiency and economic advancement

 - ◆ Transition to permanent housing in the community

 - ◆ Full-day program operates from 7am to 5pm and includes breakfast, lunch, and an afternoon snack

 - ◆ Emphasizes the parent as the primary teacher
 - ◆ Home visitor meets with the family and child in the family home for an hour and a half each week to teach good parenting practices, parenting skills, and lessons to promote parent-child interactions
 - ◆ Bi-monthly cluster meetings at various sites with other home-base families to promote group socialization
 - Eligibility requirements:
 - ◆ Child must be between three to five years of age
 - ◆ Family must meet the Federal income requirements

 - ◆ ‘Ohana Nurturing seeks to strengthen the family's understanding of early childhood development
 - ◆ Provides developmental screening and assessments including the Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ), ASQ-Social Emotional (ASQ-SE), Peabody Picture Vocabulary Test (PPVT) and Ounce Scale Assessments

 - SPDH provides support and services to single parents or displaced homemakers to help them gain marketable skills to lead them to economic self-sufficiency
 - Students are eligible for services if they are a student at KCC, a single parent (unmarried, divorced, legally separated, or widowed) with custody of a minor child or children OR a displaced homemaker who has lost the main source of income due to divorce, separation, disability, death of a spouse, or other similar event
 - ◆ SPDH also considers the student's major, household income, financial need, and grades when determining eligibility for financial assistance
 - Services include career and personal counseling, information and linkage to childcare and financial aid / scholarships, textbook assistance, and referrals to community resources

 - KS' preschools operate for 10 months a year (August to May)
 - **Applicants wanting to be considered under the KS' preference policy must verify Hawaiian Ancestry through the Ho'oulu Data Center**

 - Tuition for K-6th grade at KS Kapālama Campus is \$4,083
 - ◆ Financial aid available to need-based families to subsidize the cost for students to attend one of the three campuses
